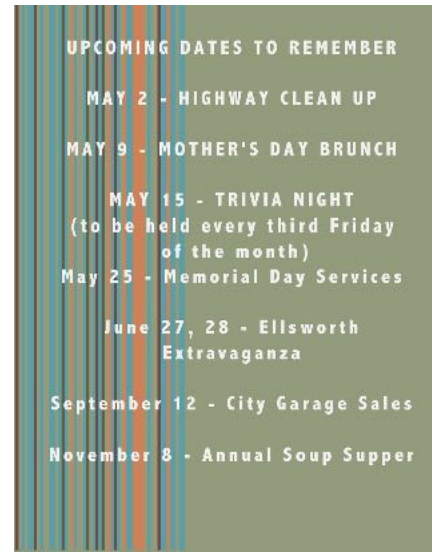

## REMEMBERING THE PAST: GREENWOOD CEMETERY

The earliest records of Greenwood Cemetery, dating back to 1893, are in Norwegian. The arch at the driveway bears the year 1881. Among the oldest marked graves is that of A. D. Holden Sexe, dated 1877.

On June 10, 1922, the Greenwood Cemetery Association was established. Ed A Reisetter was elected president, and Jesse A Nelson was elected secretary. On June 30, 1925, the cemetery was purchased from Trinity Lutheran Church for a mere dollar. Interestingly, history reveals that Greenwood Cemetery was initially the first site considered by Trinity Lutheran Church for construction, but it was later decided to build in the City of Ellsworth.

In the southwestern part of the cemetery, there are unmarked graves that are believed to be Indian graves. This is because there was an Indian trail that crossed the cemetery.

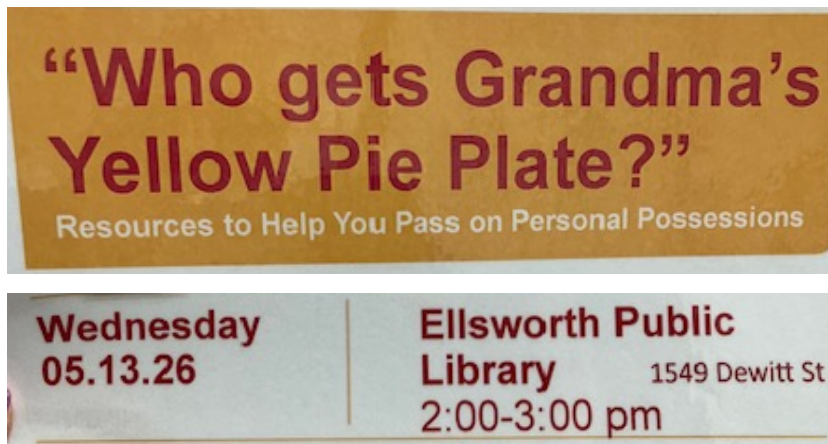

Also in attendance were Brian Zimmerman, Fire Chief Jaysen Evans, Bolton and Menk engineer Jim Leiding, Library board member Linda Bottorff, Library Director Roxann Boyce, City Financial Advisor Nate Summers, Nolan Bower, and Kurtis Bower.

**AGENDA APPROVAL:** Motion by Olson, seconded by Phipps to approve the agenda. Roll call votes 4-0. Motion carried.

**CONSENT AGENDA:** Motion by Phipps and seconded by Olson to approve the following items listed on the consent agenda:

**RESOLUTION TO SET THE DATE FOR HEARING ON PROPOSAL TO ENTER INTO A GENERAL OBLIGATION WATER IMPROVEMENT LOAN AND DISBURSEMENT AGREEMENT AND TO BORROW MONEY THEREUNDER IN A PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$1,000,000:** City financial advisor with UMB Bank Nate Summers, presented council with a summary of Ellsworth's debt limit and valuation trends, and was present to answer any questions the Council had. Motion by Phipps and seconded by Olson to approve Resolution 04-13-2026 Resolution to fix a date for a public hearing on proposal to enter into a General Obligation Water Improvement Loan and Disbursement Agreement and to borrow money thereunder in a principal amount not to exceed \$1,000,000 on May 11, 2026, 6 pm. Roll call votes 4-0. Motion carried.

**RESOLUTION AWARDDING CONTRACT FOR THE 200,000 GALLON ELEVATED WATER STORAGE TANK PROJECT:** Jim Leiding with Bolton and Menk was present to answer any questions the Council had concerning the project and to present the bids received at the April 7th bid letting at City Hall. Motion by Phipps and seconded by Jensen to approve Resolution 04-13-2026(2) awarding contract for the 200,000 Gallon Elevated Water Storage Tank Project to low bid Phoenix Fabricators in the amount of \$2,905,324 and including the alternate amount for a 300,000 Gallon capacity of \$178,449. Roll call votes 4-0. Motion carried.

**LIBRARY:** Board member Linda Bottorff and Library Director Roxann Boyce were present to request a credit card for the library for emergency purchases. Council discussed reservations stemming from past credit card abuse by previous staff, as well as the need for open communication with the city clerk regarding planned purchases through the city's existing tax-exempt accounts. Clerk Eckers did mention that coding the individual charges coming in off a credit card can be time-consuming, and preferred the system already in place for getting the library supplies and books they need. Motion by Funk and seconded by Phipps to allow a probationary credit card with a monthly limit of \$50. Roll call votes 4-0. Motion carried.

**FIRE/EMS:** Fire Chief Jaysen Evans was present to discuss the need for and to provide a quote for purchasing a new ambulance for the city of Ellsworth's EMS department. This purchase would be using funding available through the new tax fund for EMS services. The quote from NCL Government Capital Lease Servicing Center for a Crestline CCL166 Ford E-Series Ambulance is \$216,313.62, and with a trade-in of the current Ambulance purchase price, would be \$208,813.62, with the first payment due at the end of May 2026. Motion by Phipps and seconded by Olson to approve the purchase of the new ambulance using levied funds. Roll call votes 4-0. Motion carried.

The first stage RO membranes arrived at the water plant today and will be installed by the end of the week. Bolton and Menk engineer Derek Ten Pas, who was present the last time RO membranes were replaced, submitted a memorandum recommending that source water be tested at a minimum before installing any more membranes and turning the RO system on. Vanlangen has been in regular communication with DNR officials to remain in compliance and ensure appropriate steps are taken to continue providing safe drinking water to Ellsworth's residents. Councilman Phipps discussed with Council that he has researched and discussed a replacement water affidavit operator should the need arise in the future. Motion by Funk and seconded by Jensen to pursue a meeting with the current affidavit operator, supervisor Vanlangen, and the proposed new/replacement operator in the next month. Roll call votes 3-0 with Phipps abstaining.

Supervisor Vanlangen will contact the Ellsworth Telephone Cooperative to determine whether there's a network issue that can be resolved. c. Clerk Eckers requested that, now that the trees have budded out, a tree inventory be taken on privately owned dead, diseased, or dangerous trees within city limits. Mayor Anksorus has been working on a mapping system, and this will be presented at the next Council meeting. d. Friday March 27<sup>th</sup> water affidavit operator Alan Hanson, a Bolton and Menk engineer, City staff Vanlangen, and Knickerbocker, and staff from RO filter supplier Consolidated Sales were present to replace stage 3 membranes that were delivered that day. The system was cycled and within a few minutes it became clear the stage 1 filters were clogged. The request for today's meeting is to replace the stage 1 filters with the same LG filters installed March 27<sup>th</sup>. Motion by Jensen and seconded by Phipps to approve the purchase of 30 stage 1 filters for \$13,212 with the installation being supervised by Wigen Water Technologies staff as well as Alan Hanson and Supervisor Vanlanen. Roll call votes 4-0. Motion carried.

**CONCRETE FLOOR CITY SHED:** Supervisor Vanlangen presented the Council with a quote from Wirth Concrete Construction Inc to help install a drain and pour concrete for the floor of the new City shed. Motion by Funk and seconded by Jensen to approve the quote from Wirth Concrete in the amount of \$27,400. Roll call votes 4-0. Motion carried.
